Related to Reading

The Three Sounds of Suffix -ed

waited grabbed jumped

Each of these three words ends with the suffix *-ed*. All three appear to the eye as two syllable words. Your ears, however, tell you that only *waited* has two spoken syllables.

No wonder our students think English spelling is crazy!

In *waited* the letter **e** spells the schwa vowel sound (/a/). But in *grabbed* and *jumped* the letter **e** is not spelling a sound at all. In these words the suffix *-ed* only adds a consonant sound (/d/ and /t/ respectively), not a syllable.

So, what are we to tell our students about the suffix -ed? Read More...

Research Review

The Value of Nonsense Words

Several well-regarded norm-referenced, criterion-based, and informal assessments use nonsense words to test a student's ability to decode. A number of intervention programs for poor readers also include reading nonsense words as part of the instruction. On occasion, a reading teacher or coach will question us about the value of assessing and teaching nonsense words and ask if any research supports using nonsense words.

Research about Nonsense Words

Indeed, a large body of research supports the use of nonsense words. Virtually all research around nonsense words focuses on their value in assessing a student's decoding abilities.
